The plot follows the perspective of Mallory, a girl who resorts to silence as a way to cope with trauma and abuse she faced in her previous foster home. But when Mallory starts high school for the first time after being homeschooled, she reunites with Rider, the boy who survived their old foster home. But both of them are still dealing with their childhood trauma, and it's up to Mallory and Rider to work together to become stronger, face challenges, and find a relationship between each other. But when life becomes complicated, and things get out of hand, it seems as though forever is not a possibility anymore.

What drew you to this book?

I had read books by Jennifer L. Armentrout in the past and really enjoyed them, so when I saw she had yet another book out of which I had not read, I jumped at the opportunity. And *The Problem with Forever* did not disappoint, it contained what most Armentrout books are famous for: a fast paced plot, loveable characters with unique perspectives, and a romance that will have you invested.
