Orange is the story of a teenage girl named Naho. On the day that she is entering her junior year of high school, she discovers a letter from herself sent from 10 years in the future. The letter advises Naho to look after the new transfer student, Kakeru. Assuming it's a prank, Naho initially ignores the letter. However, she begins to believe it's real as the letter's predictions become true one by one. As Naho tries her best to save Kakeru from a terrible fate, she struggles with relationships between friends, and develops some "more-than-friends" feelings for others.

What drew you to this book?

What mainly drew me to this media was the overall concept of it. Receiving letters, or any sort of sign, from the future is just super cool to think about. I'm pretty sure everyone wishes at some point that they could get counsel from their future self on what they should or should not do, so this story fulfills that "what if?" question. In addition to the plot, the art style of the novel just drew me in. It's very warm and aesthetically pleasing to me.
