La Haine is a French film set in the suburbs of Paris in the 1990s. It begins in a turbulent time after the police have gravely injured a young man, Abdel. The film takes place in a span of under 24 hours and follows three of Abdel's friends in the wake of the incident. All three young men come from immigrant families. Vinz is a young Jewish man with a temper who idolizes the character of Travis Bickle from Taxi Driver. Hubert is an Afro-French man who loves boxing and wishes to get out of the suburbs. Saïd is from a North African Muslim family and tries to mediate peace in his environment. The film follows the three as they act out in frustration against the oppression their community faces. In addition to youthful hooliganism, the film is balanced by meaningful, philosophical conversations between the friends as they muse on their world. The film discusses matters such as prejudice, hatred, violence, oppression, and friendship but with a youthful spirit.

I originally watched the film because I had seen Vincent Cassel, who plays Vinz, in the film Black Swan. I was also drawn to the storyline because police violence is a prevalent issue in American society but seeing it in the context of another country was really interesting.
