"Things Fall Apart" depicts the life of a man named Okonkwo, who belongs to an indigenous tribe in modern day Nigeria. Okonkwo is admired in his village for possessing incredible strength and agricultural skill, but his quick temper and inability to connect to those around him show how he is far more complex than the powerful exterior he wishes to present. The novel also displays the impacts of colonialism on a village that describes a bicycle as an "iron horse".
