Boy21 by Matthew Quick is about Finley, a high school basketball player in a heavy-spirited town, whose life changes when he meets Boy21, an unusual teammate who believes he is from outer space. As they slowly bond over basketball and find common interest, their friendship allows both of them to confront their internal struggles and find hope. Boy21 is a moving exploration of resilience, friendship, and finding the courage to grow.

What drew you to this book?

The combination of sports, mystery, and emotional themes all contribute to the uniqueness of the story. The way that the novel explores friendship and how beneficial it is to have some kind of friendship with characters who feel real and vulnerable, really adds to the immersion of the book. Another part of the book that drew me in was Matthew Quick's writing style. It is so engaging that it makes it so easy to get invested in the lives of the characters and the challenges they face.

Did it remind you of something that you've previously read?

The Outsiders has a similar sense of loyalty, resilience, and struggle inside of a tough environment.

Anybody who enjoys sports fiction or plot twists will also find this novel interesting. Additionally, readers who see basketball as more than just a game but instead a path to self-discovery may enjoy Boy21.
